Getting patients where they need to be

A sometimes neglected but crucial part of patient care is getting patients where they need to be, whether a diagnostic test, lab work or other procedure is being performed.

At large hospitals, coordinating where a large number of patients need to go at the right time requires communication throughout the continuum of care.

At Baptist Memorial Hospital-Memphis, transportation manager Jimmy Kirkpatrick manages a staff of more than 50 colleagues, whose focus is getting patients where they need to be.

"If a patient needs an X-ray or MRI, they have to get from their room to that department to have the test done," said transporter Mary Edwards, who has worked with Baptist for nearly 12 years. "It's hard work, but I enjoy it."

Edwards hasn't kept track how much she walks daily, but lead transporter and dispatcher Otis Harris said each transporter may walk five miles a day during a shift.

"Our focus is to get the patient where they need to be, and when the hospital is busy, transporters can make as many as 25 runs a day," Harris said. "Many days, we'll have 500 transports."

Edwards was well on her way to 24 trans-

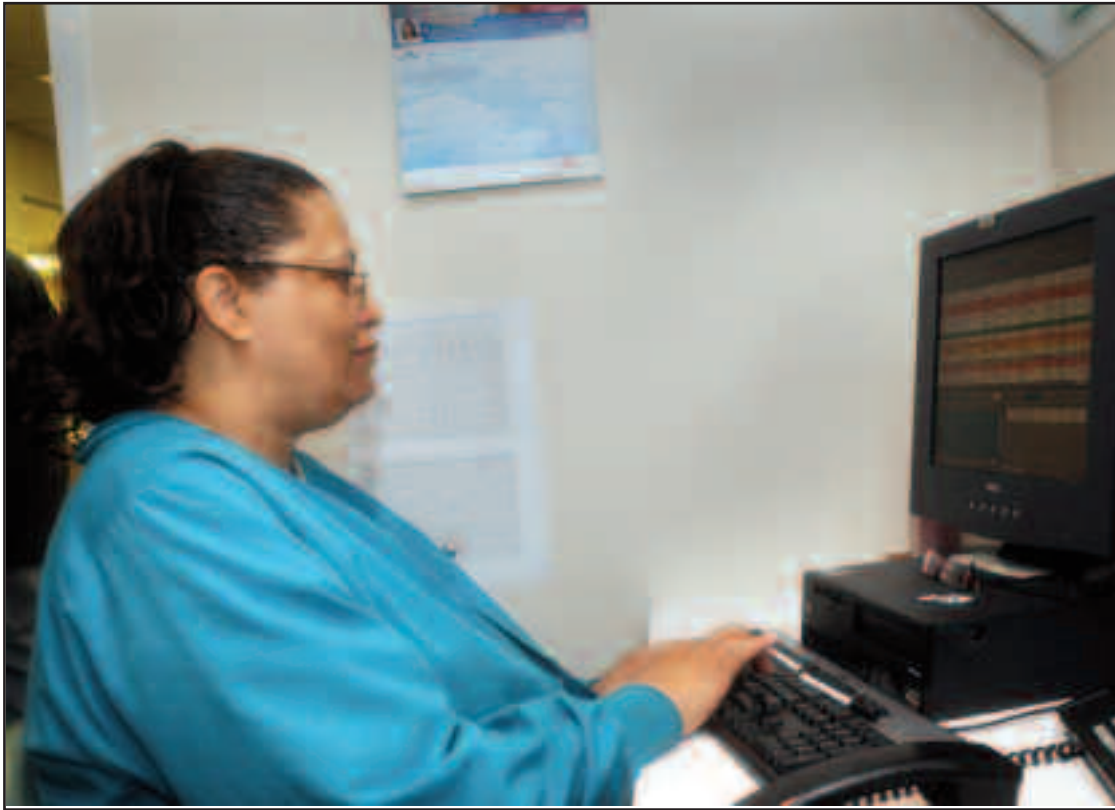

ports this day in May when she arrives outside a room on 4 North to take a patient for an X-ray. She checks in at the nurses' station to confirm the patient, then moves the patient to a stretcher for transport. Edwards then speaks with the patient to further confirm the transport, identify herself and also let the patient know what is happening. This patient suffered fractured legs because of an automobile accident.

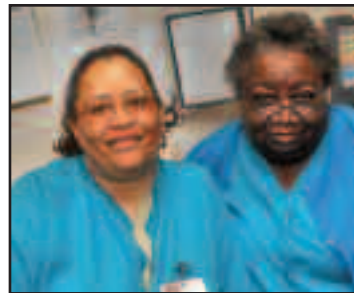
"Some patients want you to talk to them; some don't," Kirkpatrick said. "Transporters are an extension of the nurse, and it is a very rewarding job for those who seek to serve. We stress that no matter who that patient is, they are treated with dignity, respect and like a member of the family."

Edwards speaks very little, weaving her patient through the hallways of 4 North and into an

elevator. Colleagues seem to know who she is, and she smiles and says hello as she passes. Without wasted movement, she escorts the patient to X-ray, then calls dispatch for another transport.

At dispatch, they check off Edwards' patient transport in the computer and assign another. Orders for transport are submitted by departments electronically or by phone to dispatch.

"When the transporter calls in confirming a transport is complete, we try to give them a run where the patient is nearby, so they don't spend too much time walking without a patient," dispatcher Arlene Bradley said. "It can get real busy when there are a lot of requests, but we try to keep things as efficient as possible for everyone involved — one delay means a wait for everyone else."



In addition to service, transporters also fill a key role in patient satisfaction. If patients are going to have a test performed or are leaving a test to go back to their room, they may either be anxious or they may have just received bad news about their health. Transporters read the situation and act accordingly, Kirkpatrick said.

"Some patients don't want to talk," he said. "Others want to be prayed for. You have to sense what patients need — and many times, it's the little things."

Edwards finishes her shift after completing her 24th patient transport. She said she's done as many as 27 in one day.

"I don't know how far I walk during the day. I know it's hard work," Edwards said. "But I enjoy doing this and fulfilling my role to help care for patients."
