## Baptist Huntingdon celebrates Veterans Day

Baptist Memorial Hospital-Huntingdon celebrated Veterans Day with a special tribute to colleagues and family members who are active or have served in the military.

"Our employees, their families and military personnel currently serving or who have served our nation deserve to be honored with respect for their many sacrifices, including their lives, to protect us," said Susan Breeden, administrator and CEO of Baptist Huntingdon. "Freedom is a precious gift we should never take for granted; we owe a multitude of thanks to those brave people who have fought to protect us and who have provided this precious gift of freedom for us."

Approximately 100 people attended the event, which was held in the hospital's dining room. U.S. Marine Derrick Jowers of Baptist Huntingdon's materials management department conducted the opening prayer, and Cassie Allen of health information management sang the national anthem.

The event's guest speaker was Sergeant First Class Tim Springman of the Army National Guard. Springman has served full time for the past 23 years. He resides in Huntingdon and is awaiting his fourth deployment to Iraq.

Previously, he was sent to Saudi Arabia during Operation Desert Storm in 1990, Kuwait in 1996 and Iraq in 2004.

Springman shared a PowerPoint presentation of his most recent experience in Iraq.

## Shoebboxes headed to soldiers

More than 1,190 gift boxes destined for soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan were recently loaded into Army green transport trucks parked outside the lobby of Baptist Memorial Hospital-DeSoto.

BaptistDeSoto volunteers and members of the hospital's surgical unit and other departments helped prepare the boxes for their long journey overseas as part of the Shoebboxes for Soldiers effort.

Senior hospital officials looked on as soldiers, along with hospital volunteers, were honored during a brief ceremony Tuesday.

"The needs of the troops is always a high priority," said Kate Hickson, director of volunteer services at Baptist DeSoto.

"I would say the recession has not impacted the volunteer effort at all. Everyone has really stepped up," she added.

Rickey Pope, Project Package founder and coordinator, praised the Baptist volunteers for spearheading the effort. Pope's organization, which has three locations in the north Mississippi cities of Corinth, Tupelo and Southaven, sends a monthly care package to soldiers.

"I'm just overwhelmed," Pope said. "One of the most unbelievable things is that even with hard times, people still step up to help our troops. The most exciting thing for a soldier is when they receive a package from someone they don't even know. This is the sixth Christmas we've done this and this has been the most generous."

Sgt. Thomas Bell with the 2/185th Aviation Unit of the Mississippi Army National Guard said the gift boxes mean a great deal to the soldiers who are more than 10,000 miles away in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"I did a tour of Iraq in 2005 and I can tell you it's nice to get stuff from home," Bell said. "You expect to get some things like phone cards to be able to make calls home but it sure is nice to get a package."

Theresa Lane of Horn Lake agreed. Her son, Steven Hahn, 23, is serving his second tour of duty in Iraq.

"He loves getting a package," Lane said. "People don't realize what it's like over there. These gift baskets help morale, especially when they realize these packages come from the people of the community."

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## Baptist North Mississippi earns bariatric recertification

Baptist Memorial Hospital-North Mississippi recently received its recertification as a bariatric surgery center of excellence by meeting the requirements of the American Society for Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery and the Surgical Review Corporation.

The certification includes the Baptist Weight Loss Center at Baptist North Mississippi and Drs. Walker Byars and Michael King, two Oxford bariatric surgeons who perform the procedure at the hospital.

To achieve the status as a center of excellence, the center had to meet specific care requirements set by the ASMBBS and SRC.

An SRC inspector also conducted an on-site visit before the program was recertified.

Baptist North Mississippi first became a bariatric surgery center of excellence in 2005 and the recertification procedure occurs every three years.

"We are very pleased we can continue to call our weight loss center a bariatric surgery center of excellence," said Don Hutson, administrator and CEO of Baptist North Mississippi. "We continually strive to provide high-quality care to our patients, and this designation proves our efforts have been successful."

In the coming months, Baptist Memorial Health Care's goal of providing high-quality care to hospice patients in a home-like atmosphere and comprehensive bereavement services for their families will soon be realized with the completion of the Baptist Trinity Hospice House and Kemmons Wilson Family Center for Good Grief.

The house, which is located on the campus of Baptist Memorial

Hospital-Collierville, will be the first of its kind in the area, a residential hospice providing a beautiful and peaceful setting with added conveniences for patients and loved ones. The house itself resembles one you might find in any subdivision, only on a larger scale.

Careful thought and consideration have been made with every detail. For example, in a hospital it is typical for oxygen outlets to be visible.

In the hospice house, oxygen will be camouflaged so visitors and patients will not know it is there unless it is needed. The focus of the care will be on making the most of each moment.

All patients will be given the sense of dignity and control they deserve in the final days of their lives. Residents will enjoy complimentary pet, music and art therapy.

An Internet café will provide wireless Internet access for family members who wish to connect with loved ones who may not be able to visit or live far away.

One of the most significant additions that will distinguish our program is the 4,000-square-foot bereavement center, the Kemmons Wilson Family Center for Good Grief.

The center is designed to have several different types of rooms that offer bereavement services for people of varying ages, beginning with children as young as 3.

Because 3 and 4-year-old children communicate differently than an 8 or 9-year-old child, and elementary school-age children communicate differently than teenagers, individual rooms will be equipped to meet specific developmental needs. The age-specific rooms allow our social workers to

provide the support these individuals need based on their stage of life.

The hospice house and bereavement center, which will open in the summer of 2010, will also offer an outdoor recreation therapy area with a climbing boulder and a ropes course that will be used as a tool for those going through the grief process. The area mimics a camp-like atmosphere similar to Baptist Trinity's Camp Good Grief.

We are proud to have the opportunity to provide a haven for patients at the end of life, and to provide hope and support for their loved ones through the bereavement center — all on one campus.
