## Baptist Collierville prayer garden offers place of peace for patients and loved ones

After hearing news that her cancer treatment might not be working, Kerri Pleban took a walk on the campus of Baptist Memorial Hospital-Collierville to think about the future and what another round of radiation would mean for her and her family.

It was during her walk that she discovered a place she never knew existed: the prayer garden.

"The Lord used the prayer garden to minister to me during a very difficult period of my life in a very real, specific and tangible way," she said. "He met with me

on a day when I was confused and afraid about what my future held, and he used the symbols of my faith to remind me that through his Son, we have hope for our future."

In the fall of 2009, Pleban was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. After going through a complete thyroidectomy, she underwent radioactive iodine treatment. Unfortunately, undergoing the treatment meant she would have to be isolated from her family – husband, Stan, and sons, Max, 10, Luke, 8, and Zak,<sup>1</sup> – for an extended period of time.

## Baptist and Davis Vision launch partnership to assist homeless Memphians

Baptist Memorial Health Care and Davis Vision recently announced a partnership benefiting underserved Memphians.

Through Baptist Operation Outreach, Baptist's health care clinic van, and Davis Vision's Focus on America program, free vision screenings, follow-up care and eyeglasses will be provided to underserved or uninsured patients in Memphis. The program is the first of its kind in the area.

"Without partnerships like the one we are creating, many of our patients wouldn't be able to afford eye exams and glasses," said Jason Little, vice president and market leader for Baptist Memorial Health Care. "We look forward to working with Davis Vision to support those in need of vision care."

Baptist and Davis Vision kicked off the partnership with a health

screening event for Baptist Operation Outreach patients on Friday, May 21.

Screenings included dental, blood pressure, body mass index, glucose and cholesterol. The vision screenings were provided by Davis Vision and Eyemaster, and Bellevue Baptist Mobile Dental Clinic provided dental screenings.

"Taking care of one's eyesight is important, and the services offered provided eye care or vision correction to those in need," said Terry Ward, Davis Vision's divisional vice president of sales, South division.

The Baptist Operation Outreach health care van program was established in 2003 to bring much-needed health care to the

homeless.

The clinic visits two locations a week, Memphis Union Mission and Associated Catholic Charities, and delivers primary care to anyone who needs it.

In 2009, Baptist Operation Outreach provided \$2.6 million in health care to approximately 3,000 Memphis-area homeless individuals.

## Baptist receives Foundation grant for nurse leadership coach

The Baptist Memorial Health Care Foundation board of directors recently approved a grant requested by the Baptist Nursing Leadership Institute class of 2008 in the amount of \$334,733 to hire a nurse leadership coach for the hospital system.

The coach will operate out of Baptist's corporate office and will be responsible for improving nurse manager, staff nurse, physician and patient satisfaction scores; facilitate training of nurse managers to improve confidence and competency skills; decrease nurse manager turnover; collaborate with entity leaders to identify and meet educational and leadership needs; and provide resources and mentorship to nurse managers and emerging nurse leaders.

Laura Davis, chief nursing

officer for Baptist Memorial Hospital-Union County, met with fellow graduates of the BNLI to conduct research on the importance of a nurse leadership coach to Baptist.

They found that nurse managers lack formal preparation for their roles and are often overwhelmed in their positions.

"The nurse leadership coach will be a vital role in transitioning a nurse who has had formal training in relation to bedside care into a nursing leader who can lead in overall patient care," Davis said.

The Foundation grant will fund the position for three years. After the grant has been exhausted, the program will be funded through Baptist's operational budget.

## Two Baptist hospitals recognized for quality excellence

According to new results from the 2009 Leapfrog Hospital Survey released at the Memphis Business Group on Health's annual awards luncheon, Memphis-area hospitals, including Baptist Memorial Hospital-Memphis and Baptist Memorial Hospital-DeSoto, lead the nation in certain areas of quality.

In addition to releasing the Memphis-area results for the Leapfrog Survey, MBGH recognized local hospitals that have high performance scores in six areas of patient care.

Baptist Memphis and Baptist DeSoto received recognition in heart bypass and Baptist Memphis was also recognized for aortic valve replacement, pancreatic resection and esophageal resection.

The awards are based on patient survivability. The procedures that Baptist Memphis and Baptist DeSoto were recognized for are high-risk, but mortality rates at the recognized facilities were lower than the national average.

Memphis-area hospitals also compared well with national averages for the quality of care

provided for heart angioplasty, aortic valve replacement, pancreatic resection, esophageal resection, bariatric (weight loss) surgery and high-risk deliveries.

"It's exciting to host this event, release the 2009 Leapfrog results for Memphis and recognize our local hospitals for their efforts to improve care," said Cristie Upshaw Travis, CEO of the MBGH.

"This is a voluntary survey, and it reflects very positively on the Memphis health care community that these hospitals are willing to participate."

The annual Leapfrog Hospital Survey compares hospitals' performance on the national standards of safety, quality and efficiency that are most relevant to consumers and purchasers of care.

Leapfrog uses a panel of experts to select measures that are evidence-based in peer-reviewed literature and have the most dramatic impact on patient outcomes and cost effectiveness. MBGH is one of 43 official Regional Roll-Outs for the Leapfrog Group.

"For most patients, an isolation period of three to five days is required until they reach a safe level of radioactive activity," she said. "However, patients with small children, especially infants, should consider a much longer period of time away as infants require much more intimate contact with their parents and are extremely vulnerable to the effects of radiation."

As Zak was only nine months old during Pleban's treatment, she decided to exercise extreme caution and stay with her parents for three weeks while waiting for her radiation levels to go inert.

The news that she might have to undergo more radiation was disappointing news for her, as she longed to see her family and baby.

"I was heartbroken at the thought of starting over again," she said. "Concerned about the future, I went for another walk, this time taking another route."

As she rounded the corner and passed the emergency room entrance, she was taken aback by the three wooden crosses and replica of a tomb situated atop the hill behind the hospital.

She explored the area, and before she left, she prayed at the foot of Jesus' cross.

The prayer garden is a "labor of

love" for many Baptist Collierville colleagues, including Chaplain Ken Frazier, Allen Voss and Leon Brewer.

In 2005, Brewer constructed a lone cross on the hill that is now home to the prayer garden.

The following year, Ray Carr of Ray Carr Stone Works offered to donate materials to build a replica of a tomb alongside the cross.

"After several years, the aging cross needed to be replaced," Frazier said. "Members of Covenant Baptist Church in Collierville graciously donated the cedar lumber needed to erect three new crosses."

Curtis Bowery, a local Boy Scout working to achieve his Eagle Scout status, volunteered to build and install the crosses as part of his community project.

Following the installation of the crosses, Voss, a registered nurse with Baptist Collierville, sketched out plans for the garden, and hospital colleagues assisted in providing materials and labor to finish the garden. Voss also constructed two benches out of a donated cedar log for placement in the garden.

First Baptist Church in Collierville donated two scripture plaques, which were also placed in the garden.

"Building the prayer garden was a cooperative effort among

employees of the hospital and members of the community," Frazier said. "The garden complements the mission of the hospital, which is providing quality health care in keeping with the three-fold ministry of Christ – healing, preaching and teaching."

For Pleban, the garden provided her solace and encouragement during her isolation from her family. On her last day away from her family, she stopped by the garden again to pray. During the visit, she decided to invite friends and family to return to the garden on Good Friday to pray between noon and 3 p.m.

"Seven families were with me on that beautiful day," she said. "We fellowshiped and prayed from noon until almost three, and then we gathered at the foot of the

cross and prayed collectively, thanking Jesus for the sacrifice He made."

Pleban shared her story of faith and discovering the prayer garden at the garden's dedication ceremony, which was held Wednesday, May 26. Just two days later, she received important news from her physician regarding her cancer treatment.

"My treatment seems to be working," she said. "I think Ephesians 3:20-21 says what I feel in my heart best: 'Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is a work within us, to Him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.'"
