

Baptist DeSoto's Volunteen program offers up-close health care experience

For 16-year-old high school student Demetrins Bonner, volunteering is an important part of life. For the past few summers, the Coldwater, Miss., native has volunteered with his community's youth baseball team.

This summer, he was given the opportunity to participate in the Volunteen program at Baptist Memorial Hospital-DeSoto, which offers teenagers between the ages of 14 and 17 the chance to participate in all aspects of hospital life.

Bonner works two eight-hour shifts during the week in the surgery and rehabilitation departments. His responsibilities range from stocking the shelves with medical supplies to assisting patients and therapists during rehabilitation therapy.

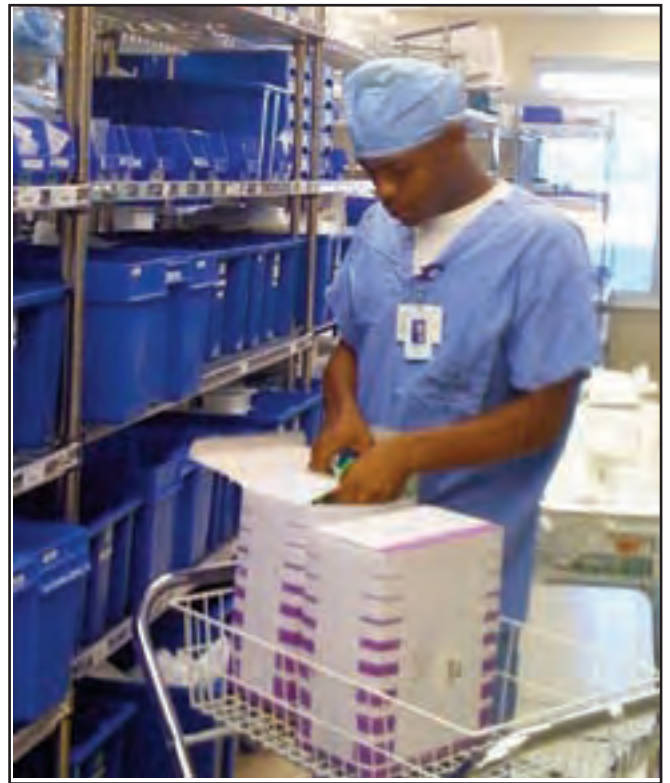
"The health care industry inspires me because, as a health care profes-

sional, I will one day have the knowledge to take care of my parents, friends and family, as well as anyone I come in contact with," he said.

Kate Hickson, manager of customer and physician relations at Baptist DeSoto, has organized the program for the last three years. She said the hospital accepts 25 applicants for the program, which runs for six weeks. Each applicant is interviewed and, once accepted into the program, must complete hospital orientation.

"The great thing about this program is that it gives the teenagers the opportunity to see how many jobs there are for them in a hospital that aren't necessarily related to health care," she said. "They get to see what we do on a daily basis, and some even work side-by-side with our doctors to get hands-on experience."

Safety precautions important when preparing for a new baby

The addition of a baby is a wonderful and exciting time for every family. However, being prepared for your little one's arrival is key.

Be aware of how to create the proper sleeping environment, and take steps to make sure your baby's safety gear and toys are safe.

The mattress your baby sleeps on should fit firmly in the crib, and no more than one finger should fit between the mattress and the sides of the crib.

The sheet should fit all the way under the mattress to prevent the baby from pulling the elastic corner

and becoming tangled in the sheets. Elastic straps are available to clip the sheet under the mattress, if needed.

The mattress should always be supported securely and positioned low enough to prevent the baby from pulling up and falling out. There should be no overhanging mobiles, especially once babies are big enough to get up on their hands and knees.

Bumper pads are not necessary, and no stuffed animals or sleeping devices should be in the crib. For the best information on safe sleeping, the SIDS alliance provides a list at www.firstcandle.org.

Baptist Rehab-Germantown prepares to build therapeutic playground

Baptist Rehabilitation-Germantown recently received a grant from the Baptist Memorial Health Care Foundation worth \$150,000 to assist in the building of Germantown's first community-built playground, "Everybody's Tree House."

The playground, which will be located at the Riverdale Nature Grounds project near Riverdale Elementary, is also made possible through additional donations from PlayCore, a playground manufacturer, and the city of Germantown.

"Through this partnership, we will design the play environment to meet the unique needs of children who

come to rehabilitation," said Susan Stralka, administrator and CEO of Baptist Rehab-Germantown. "Our pediatric therapists will help create the playground so the space addresses the physical, social and emotional needs of the children we serve."

The purpose of the playground is to provide a fun area for children of all ages to play, regardless of disabilities.

The tree will be made out of molded concrete, but it will have the texture of a real tree. It will be 16 feet tall and have a platform large enough to hold eight to 10 children.

"Bridget kept constant watch to attend to every need, even offering many forms of help to our family and friends," the patient wrote. "Bridget Sample should be a role model for nurses everywhere."

Each month, Baptist DeSoto's nursing administrators accept nominations and select a nurse to receive the DAISY Award. At a pres-

entation in front of the nurse's colleagues, physicians, patients and visitors, the honoree receives a certificate and a sculpture called A

Healer's Touch, hand-carved by artists of the Shona Tribe in Africa.

Compliance Corner

Question:

I have an issue with my immediate supervisor that I am not comfortable discussing with the person she reports to. What are my alternatives to report my concern?

Response:

This question is asked from time to time. While we recommend and encourage you to communicate through your chain of command, we recognize that there may be situations where you feel more comfortable reporting a concern through some other channel.

At Baptist, we want to be aware of employee issues so we can properly review, address and resolve concerns as appropriate.

There are several ways an employee issue can be reported. You may contact the corporate compliance office at 901-227-5920, the Helpline at 1-877-BMH-TIPS (264-8477) or corporate legal counsel at 901-227-5233.

You may also elect to contact your entity Human Resources Department or Corporate Human Resources.

Again, we encourage Baptist colleagues to bring forward concerns. Baptist will not tolerate retaliation against any individual who reports a concern in good faith or against any individual who provides information as a witness to the complaint.

Your baby should always sleep on his or her back, unless your physician says otherwise. Babies should never be placed on a pillow, sofa, waterbed, beanbag, adult bed or any other surface that is not designed for a baby.

They should always be harnessed in the car seat and be observed if they are napping in the car seat. Loose harness straps on car seats can choke a baby, which is why you should not make napping in the car seat a regular practice.

The temperature of the baby's room should be comfortable, around 68 to 72 degrees. Don't overdress your baby for sleep; the clothing needs to be designated as sleepwear, which is fitted and flame retardant. A fan providing moving air is also beneficial in the baby's sleep area.

Baby gear and toys should be checked frequently to make sure there are no possible hazards to your baby.

Make sure the stroller, swing and highchair do not tip over easily. Comply with the instructions and regulations on the label, and do not push your baby to use something too soon.

When preparing for your baby's arrival, it is a good idea to look closely at your own home and determine any potential hazards.

You may even try crawling on the floor to see how, from a baby's perspective, all things can be dangerous.

Many caring moms and dads have left their children alone in the car, not thinking about the danger. It is not OK to leave your baby in the car, even if you are just running to the ATM.

A number of things could happen while you are away: the temperature inside the car could rise to a deadly level in just minutes, your child could be kidnapped, or the car could

accidentally get set in motion while you are away from the car.

To help yourself remember when your baby is with you, keep a stuffed animal in the car seat when you are driving without your baby.

When your baby is in the car with you, place the toy on the passenger seat next to you. This way, you will be reminded that your baby is in the backseat.

Also, make a habit of keeping your purse and diaper bag in the backseat at all times to help remind yourself to always check the backseat before getting out of the car.

Following the proper safety procedures is an important part of preparing to bring home your new baby.

The car seat for your baby should be properly installed as well; certified child passenger safety technicians are qualified to teach parents about correct car seat use.

One of those teenagers who is getting hands-on experience is Anisha Pareek, a 15-year-old sophomore at the Southern Baptist Educational Center in Southaven. She spends her days working in the hospital's intensive care and step-down units, as well as in the marketing and diabetic education departments.

Health care is in Pareek's blood, as most of her close family members work in the health care industry. Biology is her favorite subject in school, and she hopes become a cardiologist or pediatrician following medical school.

"This program has given me many opportunities to learn about the health care field," she said. "My favorite part of the program has been being able to go with the doctors in the intensive care unit on their rounds."

Pareek's other responsibilities include running errands, cleaning equipment and preparing materials for diabetes courses, among others.

"I have really enjoyed this experience," she said. "I've learned a lot about the hospital that I never knew before."

The summer Volunteer program is just one of several ways teenagers can get involved with the hospital, Hickson said.

Baptist DeSoto also offers Experience Critical, an emergency room volunteer program for students interested in pursuing a career in medicine; CRASH Course, a summer program for high school students interested in the nursing field; and the SuperSitters course, a daylong class that covers a variety of babysitting issues, including first-aid and safety instruction.

"A lot of people are surprised at what we can offer teens," Hickson said. "The most valuable part about programs like Volunteens is the participants get to experience all different career fields within one hospital."

After completing his summer as a Volunteer, Bonner, who will be a senior at Coldwater High School in the fall, plans to begin applying for scholarships in the hopes of attending college to earn some type of medical degree.

"The Volunteer program has been an awesome opportunity for me this summer," he said. "It has given me a different look into my future career."
