Holifield finds joy in helping others heal

Myrtis Holifield always knew she wanted to be a nurse, even if it took her longer than most to achieve that goal.

Holifield was raised on a farm in Laurel, Miss., and turned down the opportunity to attend nursing school after graduating high school, which was a decision she later regretted.

"I got married and had a family, but I always knew I would go back and get my nursing education," she said. "I waited until my children were grown, and graduated in 1977."

However, Holifield got a taste of health care years before she finally began nursing school. When her husband's job transferred them to Memphis in 1963, she became a secretary on the neurology floor at Baptist Memorial Hospital-Medical Center. She continued working as a secretary part time while she finished her nursing education.

She worked on the charity floor at the Medical Center during her first year as a nurse and said the experience taught her much about health care.

"They had every health issue imaginable on that floor," she said. "I feel I learned more there than I did while I was in nursing school."

Holifield was later offered the opportunity to transfer to neurology, and she worked on that floor until 1985, when she took early retirement at age 55. However, she did not want to quit working in the field she loved, so she joined Baptist Trinity as an LPN that same year.

"It's a very rewarding career," she said. "It's a wonderful feeling to come home and say, 'I've done something to help someone to feel better today.'"

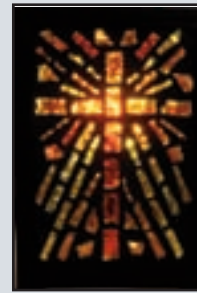
Shirley Aldridge, manager of home care informatics at Baptist Trinity, has worked with Holifield for 20 years.

"Throughout the years, it has been evident to me that one mission in her life has been dedicated to helping others," Aldridge said. "She is a spark that has shined for many years and has an outstanding work ethic."

Holifield works part time as an LPN, and she has been with her current patient for seven years.

"I really like my patient, but I'm afraid I've spoiled him," she said. "I typically stay with him on Saturdays and when any of his other nurses need time off, and he always tells me he wants me to come back every day."

She arrives at her patient's home at six in the morning and prepares his breakfast. Throughout the day, she'll do chores like laundry and dishes, but she always makes sure to spend quality time with her patient.

"I'll cut out the crossword from the newspaper and make a copy so we both can work on it together," she said. "If we don't know a word, I will look it up in my dictionary, and he'll look it up on

his iPhone."

Holifield's family plays an important role in her life outside of work. In 2006, her oldest daughter, Judy, convinced her to move from Memphis to Olive Branch, Miss.

"Judy likes to boss me around," Holifield joked, "but she really takes care of me. She lives just down the road, so if I have any trouble, she can be there very quickly."

Holifield has a cozy home with a vegetable garden. She grows a variety of peppers, as well as tomatoes and cucumbers. She and her youngest daughter, Martha, recently redecorated her kitchen, and she plans on making new curtains for her living room once she finds the right fabric.

Holifield spends a lot of time with her younger sister, Nellene, 76, who bought a house just around the corner after living in

Tulsa, Okla., for more than 50 years

"I kept asking her to move closer to me, and one day she called me and told me she was going to move to Olive Branch," Holifield said. "We eat together just about every day, go shopping and play cards. We have lots of fun."

Holifield knows she will need to make plans to retire permanently soon, as she recently spent 10 months in therapy after breaking her femur after a nasty fall, but she will miss the field she has always loved.

"I don't work in health care for myself," she said. "I'm doing it for someone else who needs help with something they might not be able to do on their own, and I feel good about it."

Johnson was nominated by a patient's family member who fell in love with her wit, personality and compassion.

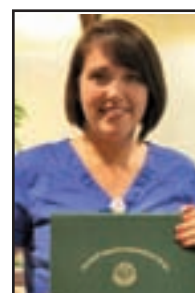
The nominator said Johnson's extraordinary care will never be forgotten.

At a presentation in front of the nurse's colleagues, physicians, patients and visitors, the honoree receives a certificate and a sculpture called A Healer's Touch, hand-carved by artists of the Shona Tribe in Africa.

The not-for-profit DAISY Foundation is based in Glen Ellen, Calif., and was established by family members in memory of J. Patrick Barnes. Barnes died at 33 in late 1999 from complications of idiopathic thrombocytopenic

You probably have read or heard about Methodist Healthcare receiving State Department of Health approval to build a hospital in Olive Branch, and you may be wondering what it means for Baptist DeSoto and our colleagues.

Baptist DeSoto's and Baptist Memorial Health Care's leadership teams are committed to continuing to provide top-notch health care to the people of this area.

We are prepared for whatever happens next, whether or not that includes another hospital in DeSoto County.

We believe it's important for every hospital in our area to provide care for as many North Mississippians as possible, regardless of their ability to pay. That's what we've done for the past 22 years, and it's what we will continue to do.

Last year, 30 percent of our emergency department patients did not have insurance, and 70 percent of our labor and delivery patients had Medicaid. A number of our patients come from Marshall County, one of the most medically underserved counties in the country.

We know there is a tremendous need for all hospitals in this area to provide access to a wide range of patients, and we want to make

sure all hospitals in this area do that.

When the Mississippi State Board of Health revised the State Health Plan to aid in the approval of an additional hospital in our service area, the board imposed a number of conditions to ensure that any new facility assumed its fair share of all services offered by a full service hospital.

These conditions include requirements that the new hospital must provide levels of indigent care and Medicaid care in excess of the average of hospitals in the service area, and that the hospital fully participate in the Mississippi Trauma Care System.

When Baptist DeSoto opened in 1988, we made a commitment to provide high-quality health care to the people in our community, and we take that commitment very

seriously. Many exciting things are going on at our hospital, and we will continue to grow well into the future.

Our heart services are booming; we are expanding our cath lab, and we are one of only three hospitals in the country participating in a clinical trial for the Diamondback 360.

The Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities just awarded our inpatient rehab department a three-year accreditation. We won the Mississippi Nurses Association's Hospital of the Year (100 beds or more) award.

So, when someone asks you what Baptist is going to do now that there may be a new hospital in town, just say we'll continue doing what we're doing now: working as hard as we can to serve the people of North Mississippi.

Baptist now accepting applications for Teen Camp Good Grief

The Baptist Trinity Center for Good Grief is now accepting applications for the 10th annual Teen Camp Good Grief to be held Friday, Oct. 15 through Sunday, Oct. 17 at Camp Bear Track in Drasco, Ark.

A professional, caring bereavement staff will have an active part in the camp, helping teens communicate their feelings and explore their grief through support groups and activities involving art, music, journaling and recreation. Transportation, lodging and meals will be provided.

Any teen between the age of 13 and 17 who has lost a loved one in the last two years is eligible for the free camp, which is funded by a grant from the Baptist Memorial Health Care Foundation.

Teen Camp Good Grief began in 2001 as the Mid-South's first teen bereavement camp and has helped more than 200 teens. Baptist Trinity Center for Good Grief also offers free camps for children and adults.

In 2005, Baptist opened the Baptist Trinity Center for Good Grief, the first comprehensive grief center for children, teenagers and adults in the region. In addition to the Camp Good Grief programs, the center offers individual and group counseling, community education and crisis intervention.

Baptist DeSoto receives grant from Susan G. Komen Foundation

A Susan G. Komen Foundation grant will enable Baptist Memorial Hospital-DeSoto to provide free digital screening mammograms and diagnostic mammograms to underserved women.

Women who live in DeSoto or Tunica counties and who are uninsured, have Medicaid or Medicare, or who otherwise cannot afford one are eligible for free mammograms.

The hospital will provide baseline mammograms for eligible women 35 to 40 years of age; women 40 and older will receive annual screening and diagnostic mammograms. Younger women may qualify for free mammograms if they have a personal or family history of breast cancer.

The grant fund will cover the cost of the mammogram, radiologist fee and additional procedures the radiologist may recommend, such as breast ultrasound and biopsies.

Women who are eligible for this service may call 662-772-2100 to request a 2010 registration form.

Other entities that have received grants from the Komen Foundation include the Women's Health Center at Baptist Memorial Hospital for Women, Baptist Memorial Hospital-North Mississippi, Baptist Memorial Hospital-Golden Triangle, Baptist Memorial Hospital-Booneville and Baptist Memorial Hospital-Union County.
